It has been a significant project to install a new electric radiant heating system in the sanctuary. I am glad that by choosing an electric system, we will reduce our 'carbon footprint' as a church. We are very fortunate to have had an alternative venue for Sunday morning worship in the Large Hall over this time. It is bright, warm and spacious. It has a good sound system. We are very grateful to those who have set up and cleared up week by week (including moving the large TV), so that we can continue to worship together on a Sunday morning.

I have enjoyed meeting in the Large Hall Sunday by Sunday. I know others have too. It has been easy to adapt the space when we have been joined by Noah's Ark. The singing has been excellent as we have sat closer to one another. Sometimes, we've found ourselves sitting next to folks we don't know so well. That is no bad thing.

It has also been a great demonstration of the truth that we read in Scripture: *'For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them'* (Matthew 18:20). There are many more than two or three of us gathering each week, but we have sensed the Lord's presence with us as we have worshipped Him together.

As we move back to worshipping in the sanctuary, we do so with a fresh realisation that the church is primarily a people, brought together in Jesus, and not a place. Let us strive then in the days ahead to *'build one another up'* in our faith in the Lord Jesus (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

It is good to see demand increase for the monthly church prayer diary. This continues to be available every month at the Sunday and Midweek Services. It can also be downloaded from the church website, www.kirkintillochstcolumbas.org.uk Please be aware that, similar to last year, we will issue a 'summer prayer diary' that will cover the months of July and August.

Prayer is vital to all we do at St Columba's Hillhead. As well as praying regularly for our church and community, we also have a responsibility to uphold in prayer the work of our mission partners and of the wider church around the world. The prayer diary is a great tool for helping us do that. Please do take a copy of the prayer diary each month to pray through at home during the month.

On Thursday evenings (term time) at the manse, all are welcome to join in a time of prayer at 7pm. We start with tea and coffee before moving to prayer. We are usually done by around 8:15pm. Do join us then if you are able. You will be made very welcome. There is no pressure at all to pray out loud if you don't feel comfortable doing so.

All our prayers, spoken and unspoken, as well as our 'amens' to the prayers of others, are heard alike by our Heavenly Father.

Sunday Club

It is great to have Sunday Club with us for the early part of the regular Sunday morning service. We're very grateful to Vicky and Cassie and others who lead and help at Sunday Club week by week. In recent weeks, Sunday Club has been learning about the Life of Moses, the Life of Solomon and Paul's Missionary Journeys. BIBLES FOR BAIRNS



Fewer than half of 0-2-year-olds are read to every day. We want to help change that.

Reading to young children helps them feel safe and loved. It builds self-esteem, grows their vocabulary, and fires their imagination. Reading the Bible can help bring a family together and closer to God.

Our vision is to offer every baby born in Scotland a free 'Share a Story' toddler Bible on their first birthday. Every birthday after that, until age five, we will send a Bible related gift. On their fifth birthday each child will receive an early reader Bible to take them through their primary school years. The Bible gifts are wrapped by volunteers each month and an individual birthday card is written to every child. Before each package is posted we pray over them, knowing that God cares for these children and their families.

This program costs just £50 per family for the five years and means that from a child's earliest memories and through their school years, the greatest stories from the Bible will play a part in shaping their lives. Our aim is to register up to 1000 babies per year, with the cumulative cost per year reaching £50k.

BUILD MY CHURCH



"Build My Church" is a project inspired by the work of the tiny Scottish Charity, Bear Necessities for Bulgaria.

Thirteen years ago Bear Necessities began supporting the children of a small, primarily gypsy village in rural Bulgaria to attend school. Currently, Bear Necessities operate a soup kitchen and medical clinic, and provide winter boots to all school aged children in the village, as well as a few other key projects, and have been doing this with the support of Rumen Ganchev, a local minister.

This project "Build My Church" will work with Rumen to plant a church at the centre

of the large residential district of the city of Sliven. We want that church to have a truly holistic approach, meaning it will offer services for teaching and worship and prayer, but in time the vision is for the church to also provide free access to health care, food for the hungry, and training and support for the leadership of other churches in the district.

OPERATION HOPE



Egypt is home to the largest Christian minority in the Middle East with around 10-12% of the population professing faith in Jesus. However, as a minority they face varying levels of discrimination and suffer poverty and lack of education, especially in the more rural areas of Upper Egypt. In local disputes with their neighbours, Christians are often blamed regardless of fault and in some cases have been forced to leave their homes.

Working with a local partner, Release International's Operation Hope project serves Christian communities in Upper Egypt helping those who are facing extreme poverty and marginalisation. Families are provided with basic living needs such as beds, toilet facilities, kitchen appliances, food, and funds to help with construction of their homes. The project also helps families to establish micro-businesses so they can begin to support themselves, and it provides psychological and spiritual care through regular visits and discipleship programmes.

The Operation Hope project aims to support 2,000 people in around 100 villages in Upper Egypt each year.

Through the Guild's generous support multiple practical needs will be met; poverty will be alleviated, the impact of persecution and marginalisation will be reduced, Christian families will be assured of their value and given opportunities to build a future, and ultimately the wider Christian community in Upper Egypt will be established, strengthened, and enabled to flourish.

PLAYFUL BEGINNINGS

CROSS REACH

Working together for these three years, let's build a house that lays a strong foundation for vulnerable families.

Together we will support families at Sunflower Garden in Edinburgh and Daisy Chain in Glasgow.

A child's early years can have an impact that lasts a lifetime. The Guild's support will ensure infants have the best possible start in life by developing strong, positive relationships between parents and children. With the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the cost of living crisis, parents are presenting to us with more trauma and distress than at any other time. Demand, and the need for your help, is greater than ever.

Research shows that parents who attend to their own emotional and psychological needs are in a better position to respond to their infants' cues and engage with them in positive ways. The Guild will support specialist perinatal therapy with creative support at Sunflower Garden. The team there delivers Parent and Infant Relationship Therapy. Parents can access their counselling sessions while leaving their baby in trusted hands.

Daisy Chain is a community based, inclusive, early intervention project for children under 12, and their families. With your support, the team will work to improve children's health and wellbeing through play and nurture. Your help will strengthen family relationships and support families to become more resilient. Children with disabilities, from deprived backgrounds and facing home challenges can thrive here.

Christian Aid Report Summer 2025

This year is the 80th anniversary of Christian Aid which was set up at the end of World War II to help alleviate the suffering of displaced families throughout Europe. The charity has gone on to help many poor and disadvantaged communities throughout the world. It works through local partner organisations in order to provide the most effective help to those in need. At the time of writing it is Christian Aid Week 2025 and this year the charity is supporting indigenous communities in Guatemala a country where it has been working for 48 years. Climate change is causing many of the staple crops to fail and Christian Aid is working through its partner Congcoop to train the small indigenous farmers, who are mostly women, to plant drought resistant crops and use different farming methods to combat the effects of the changing climate. So far this week St. Columba's Hillhead have raised £385.00 towards this work and the final total raised will be reported in the next issue of the magazine.

At the end of April the annual Christian Aid Service was held at Hillhead Church and we had a very interesting talk and video by Charlie Meiklejohn from the Christian Aid Head Office about Aurelia one of the indigenous farmers and her family and community.

Mary and I took part last Friday evening 16th May in a fund raising event, Kool Kurling, held at Lenzie Old Parish to raise funds for CA Week. It was good fun but unfortunately we didn't win the medal and chocolate bar prize!


2024 - 2025

Interim Moderator Duties

Our minister, Rev Philip Wright, has been Interim Moderator at Lenzie Old Parish Church since 1st May 2023. On 1st June 2025, Philip's time at Lenzie Old came to an end and he moved to being Interim Moderator at Lenzie Union Parish Church. Rev Julie Hearty, who is currently Assistant Minister at Lenzie Old has now also become Interim Moderator there. Both Lenzie Old and Lenzie Union are currently vacant as the two churches work towards an anticipated union in accordance with the Glasgow Presbytery mission plan.

KESWICK CONVENTION

The Convention was first held in 1875 when a few hundred Christians first met on a vicarage lawn in Keswick. Since then, across multiple generations, the Convention has seen 150 years of lives transformed in Christ.

Today a wonderful opportunity still exists to join with thousands of believers in worship and discipleship in the beautiful setting of the Lake District. The Convention is over 3 weeks in July/August and people are able to attend for as long as they wish. We have friends who will be there for the first fortnight, whereas we will only be there for the last 4 days. Daytime will see us enjoying the local scenery but the evenings will be spent sharing worship with 3000 others in the huge marquee, where we will benefit from wonderful preaching and uplifting music and singing. Sharing Communion with 3000 others is always a particularly moving experience.

King Charles unveils new plane

As part of MAF's ongoing 80th anniversary celebrations this year, King Charles unveiled MAF's latest addition to its fleet at RAF Northolt in West London. The new Cessna 208 Caravan will serve Papua New Guinea's most isolated people in the coming months.

On 3 April 2025, His Majesty King Charles III revealed the new aircraft to an excited audience at MAF's special [80th anniversary](#) event at RAF Northolt – the Royal Air Force's oldest airbase in the UK.

MAF's global fleet now comprises 118 aircraft thanks to the generosity of a UK based charitable trust. This latest plane will serve the remotest communities of Papua New Guinea (PNG) – a commonwealth country where the charity has been operating since 1951.

It was a double celebration given that PNG marks 50 years of independence this year.

Host MAF UK CEO Donovan Palmer invited the King to press a big red button, the shiny new Cessna 208 Caravan came into view as the hangar door lifted behind him.

MAF pilot Joseph Tua has worked in PNG since 2019 where MAF has its largest programme.

Joseph – who will fly the new plane to serve his own people – proudly wore his country's ceremonial face paint for the occasion. He was particularly excited to meet the King – a fellow pilot who had learnt to fly with the Royal Air Force.
